SVdP responds to many community and individual needs through programs such as disaster relief services, job training and placement, thrift stores, food pantries, housing programs, prison reentry, medical services, and many others, always seeking longer-term pathways out of poverty and towards the full flourishing of every person. 3b) Whom does this program benefit?

The Ocean City St. Vincent de Paul (OC SVdP) society was the most obvious beneficiary, but this was only the tip of the iceberg. OC SVdP received the donated funds and products collected from this joint venture for its direct service to people living in poverty in our community. Through OC's SVdP, local, needy men, women and children receive material assistance such as rent, utilities, food and clothing, as well as, OC's SVdP offers needy persons friendship, understanding and prayer. As apparent as it seems, OC's SVdP and the needy community were not the only beneficiaries of this joint program. Parishioners, neighbors, friends, family and K of C personnel interacted together gaining physical exercise and sharing free time together as a community.

3c) What problem or need did this program resolve?

This program was an excellent way to raise awareness of the issues surrounding poverty, while at the same time, raising money to help neighbors in need. It also brought some very welcomed attention to the great services that the Ocean City St. Vincent de Paul Society accomplishes, and it highlighted the local Knights of Columbus working within our community.

3d) Why did the council select this program?

Our Catholic faith teaches us to "Love thy neighbor as thyself." Members of the Knights of Columbus show love for their neighbors by conducting food drives collecting non-perishable food and gift cards for local food stores and gas stations to donate to local charity facilities. The Friends of the Poor® Walk/Run was another way that our Council recognized that we could help the local Ocean City St. Vincent de Paul Society, which can always use monetary support to purchase food and to offer material assistance to the needy.

3e) Describe the success of the program:

This was a joint effort between Council #9053 and St. Luke's. In the eyes of St. Luke's, it considered the event very successful, a Level 5 out of 5, due to dollars and products collected. From our Council's point of view, the actual participation of our members left much to be desired—a low success, Level 2 out of 5 -- probably for the short notice to our Council's members. Even though we see this success as overall Level 3 out of 5, the Ocean City St. Vincent de Paul (OC SVdP) Society was very grateful to receive the \$2,000 and products collected at this event. Our efforts help the OC SVdP to continue the mission of Jesus Christ to help people living in poverty -- to serve the poor, the suffering, and the deprived. This was our ultimate goal of the program.

Through this Living Rosary/prayers, we are asking God to intervene and help the Ukrainians to beat the devil at his own game. These people are warm, hospitable people and are very receptive to the Gospel. We see from news reports that the pain of the local people is enormous; however, they do not show fear or despair. They are well aware that their military strength can't match that of Russia, but with our prayers and God's help, we see the Ukrainians not surrendering without a fight and, in fact, regaining some of their land

3c) What problem or need did this program resolve?

The idea that power is inherent in prayer is a very popular one. Jesus has told us about the power of prayer when he said: "Truly, I say to you, whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven. Again I say to you, if two of you agree on earth about anything they ask, it will be done for them by my Father in heaven. For where two or three are gathered in my name, there am I among them." (Matthew 18:18-20). Hence as a group, we gathered to pray/petition God to help war-torn countries and have peace prevail once again.

3d) Why did the council select this program?

All of us, at one time or another, have seen what the power of prayer can accomplish. We believe that prayers could stop the devil actively trying to cause chaos and take over a peaceful country. This devil wants to make the Ukrainians become second-class citizens again like they were during the Soviet era, so we selected this visual Living Rosary as a way to ask God to help this country -- intercede for the people of Ukraine.

3e) Describe the success of the program:

In our Living Rosary, 60 persons stood in designated spots holding a rose, which represented a bead of the Rosary, while others in the Church sat in the pews. Each of the 60 persons with roses lead the group in prayer when it was their turn. As the person lead his/her prayer, another person gathered the roses representing that decade of the Rosary and placed the roses in a vase in front of Blessed Mother Mary's statue. What could have been complete chaos turned out to be a powerful testament to the Rosary coming alive for all the participants in Church. It brought people together interceding for the war-torn countries, especially Ukraine, and kept them captivated for more than 40 minutes. For Ukraine, we are more united than ever; we keep praying for them that God will help them. 3b) Whom does this program benefit?

The initial benefactors of Council #9053's food drive efforts are: The Joseph House (Salisbury), Diakonia (West Ocean City) and St. Vincent de Paul (Ocean City). Through these organizations, our donations ultimately flow down to the local needy individuals/families, whom receive the most benefit. These donations play an important part in improving the quality of life for those who are living in poverty, have low-incomes and/or are in homeless circumstances. These individuals include infants, children in foster care, families, men, women, veterans and the homeless on the Lower Eastern Shore.

3c) What problem or need did this program resolve?

Although Council #9053 cannot solve the entire 'needy' situation, we feels that our food drives and gift card collections donated to our local food pantries and shelters allow these organizations to serve our local needy neighbors with dignity. These organizations can better enable people to break free from poverty by providing additional support to help them resolve the crises that they are facing. The immediate aim is to provide help by giving food and extending a hand of friendship to our less fortunate neighbors feeling the economic pinch; the ultimately aim is help these service organizations to offer additional services like debt advice, mental health support and/or benefits guidance to these needy clients. Food drives are also a great way to raise awareness about hunger and inspire the more fortunate people to help provide alms in the future.

3d) Why did the council select this program?

The right to food is essential for a dignified life, and it is vital for the realization of many other rights such as the rights to health and a good life. Food is important not just for survival, but also for the full development of one's physical and mental capabilities. Fr. McGiveny believed that we should not have an aloof attitude or be separated from people and their problems; his primary concern was for the love and welfare of all individuals. So since the greatest of all virtues is charity or love, we see holding food drives as an extension of Father McGivney's vision for his Knights to make a difference in many of lives and to bring hope and healing to countless others.

3e) Describe the success of the program:

Hunger exists in every state and county in the United States, and the Ocean City area is no exception. Our local food pantries and shelters rely on the donations they receive to help keep their shelves stocked and provide other services. Through our food drives, Council #9053 has collected \$1,625 in cash and gift cards and 169 boxes of food to donate to these local facilities. What a rewarding example of Charity -- sharing with those less fortunate to improve their quality of life.

Our goal for this program was simple – it stemmed from the corporal works of mercy dealing with care for a person's bodily needs with food and water standing at the top of the list and clothing comes right behind as the next need. Council #9053 has provided monetary donations to Ukraine to help with food and water. Now we wanted to help the humanitarian crisis -- providing clothing. 3b) Whom does this program benefit?

Our primary goal was to benefit the Ukrainian people who have lost so much – their homes, their belonging, as well as, the troops who are in the fields and trenches defending their country from a real-time devil. A secondary goal is state-side -- as people able to help and sacrifice during our traditional Thanksgiving season, we have reaped the internal benefit of knowing that we are doing Christ's work – clothing the needy.

3c) What problem or need did this program resolve?

As temperatures drop in Ukraine and living conditions become deadly for Ukrainian people, sending new thermal clothing provides the difference between life and death for these destitute people – troop and families alike. It also gives this war-torn country hope knowing that people in other countries care for the Ukrainian people showing compassionate and empathetic for them during such a senseless war and as freezing temperatures arrive.

For our clothing drive, we choose to ask people to donate new, unused thermal clothing to eliminate an unnecessary problem for the Ukrainian people to have to sort through unusable clothing. These people have enough issues trying to survive so we wanted our 'alms-giving' effort to be effective immediately.

3d) Why did the council select this program?

Beginning the Knights of Columbus Fiscal Year (FY) 2021-2022 and continuing in FY 2022-2023, Council #9053 has held charity fundraisers and donated monetary support to the Ukrainian Relief Fund. During this timeframe, we have seen the destruction of houses and lack of access to fuel and electricity in Ukraine. With the winter season approaching, a St. Luke's parishioner, who immigrated from Ukraine to the America and who still has family in Ukraine, as well as stateside, suggested collecting new thermal clothing to send to the Ukrainian people. When Council #9053 heard this idea and having previously completed several successful joint efforts with St. Luke's, we knew that together our Council and St. Luke's could help families and friends in the cross-hairs of this crisis. We could help save lives in Ukraine. (Continued on Page 3 of 3)

3e) Describe the success of the program:

This joint effort was a very successful endeavor. In the words of St. Luke's Religious Education Coordinator, Kim Zarif,: "The Ukraine drive was so successful-thanks to the KoC/Lady Knights participation. When we work together, nothing is impossible! "We collected eight (8) huge boxes of thermal clothing plus \$300 to help to cover the shipping costs. Physically, this shipment of clothing will help protect the Ukrainian people from the elements. The shipment of clothing began its journey on 23 November 2022, and it arrived in Dnipro (formerly called Dnepropetrovsk) Ukraine on 10 January 2023.

Program Title: Ukraine Clothing Drive

3a) In the space provided below, briefly describe the purpose and goals of this program – *Continued*

on the Ukrainian country – especially during this country's winter season by providing winter clothing and tangible items such as sleeping bags, military blankets, thermals socks, gloves, long sleeve underwear and pants, hunter suits and hats. Jesus described this merciful work as "naked and you clothed me" (Matthew 25:36). Nakedness can mean nudity, the complete lack of clothing, but more often as in Ukraine, it means partial or inadequate clothing.

3d) Why did the council select this program – *Continued*?

Coupled with knowing that for the Ukrainian people surviving the winter would be difficult and could become a matter of life or death, we began our joint effort to collect sleeping bags, military blankets, thermals socks, gloves, long sleeve underwear and pants, hunter suits, and hats. As an additional incentive, this parishioner told St. Luke's and our Council that she has a stateside family member who owns an international shipping business. This relative volunteered to help pay for the shipping of our donations via his business. This effort quickly became a 'no brainer' and came to fruition.


